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The Lake Waukomis cell tower has been a part of our landscape since 2008 and services AT&T mobile customers. In 2016, the cell tower management company, Crown Castle, approached the Lake Waukomis Association with a proposal to raise the tower 20 feet and add Verizon Wireless with room for a third cellphone carrier. The economic benefit to our community was a \$35,000 signing bonus and an annual rent increase of nearly \$14,000 with a 3% year over year increase from Verizon. The Association agreed to the proposal but, due to economic conditions in the cellphone market and inability to obtain certification to raise the existing cell tower, Crown Castle pulled out of the project. In May of 2018, Crown Castle revived the cell tower talks with a new proposal to replace the existing tower with a 30 foot taller structure east of the current tower, add 468 square feet to their existing footprint at the base of the tower, and add Verizon Wireless. The new tower will have the capacity for a third carrier. In September of 2018 the board approved an agreement giving Crown Castle a five-year option on an additional 468 square feet of land and a 20-year extension on the original lease. For the option and lease extension, the Association will receive \$20,000 to be paid in October. Once the option is exercised by Crown Castle, the Association will begin receiving monthly rent of \$1,163 from Verizon that increases 3% yearly in addition to the rent received from AT&T. When construction of the new tower starts the Association will receive another \$20,000. Reality is, cell towers are everywhere and we see them so often they have almost become part of the terrain. They are not pretty but do serve a purpose and here at Lake Waukomis cell tower revenue has provided financial benefits that help keep Association dues low.

The 2018 storm water grant project started in October and is scheduled to be completed November 7th. The drain pipe that runs under the road at 756 is being repaired, then extended to the lake edge. A portion of the guard rail along the road will be removed and 280 cubic yards of fill placed in the ravine to shore up the roadway, support the banks, and diminish erosion. Traffic in that area may be interrupted during short periods during construction. Please be patient, the improvements will far outweigh any inconvenience.

Mayor's Message

There are so many thoughts that I want to put down in this month's Mayor's Message, but I do not have the space to say everything that I would like to express. I will do my best to give a condensed version.

First, I would personally like to thank Ed Landis for his years of service to our community as Operations Manager for Lake Waukomis. It can be a thankless job as many of the responsibilities are done behind the scenes. Ed has ensured that the roadways were always cleared of snow and ice for our residents. Whether it meant clearing the roads late at night or running to get salt from Platte County during the bad weather, the roads were always the best in Platte County. I personally had the pleasure of working as Board Liaison for the Maintenance Department to work with Ed on finding the funds to complete the repairs of the roads, sewer and water lines, and City Park. There were times that Ed and his team would be in the trenches fixing the city's 60 year old infrastructure so that all would have water to use, toilets to flush, and roads to drive on. Sometimes it caused an inconvenience for residents, but he always worked diligently to get the repairs done as quickly as possible to keep the city running. Ed was a planner as well. We worked together to plan future needs of Lake Waukomis and he was instrumental in addressing the special lining to extend the life of our sewer system. He took the lead in the upgrade of the fire hydrants in the city so that all fire hydrants are within acceptable reach of every home. Thank you, Ed Landis, for allowing me the chance to work with you the past three years. I have learned a lot from our time together about our city. Now it is your time to relax and enjoy your retirement.

Second, it is great to see the lake start to refill and the South Park renovation starting to look green again. Thanks to Alderwoman Debora Hankinson for getting the park grant written and approved. Thanks to our Maintenance team along with the help of volunteers to install the ball diamond backstops. Hopefully by next spring we will see the fruits of everyone's labor to produce a beautiful park that we will all enjoy for years to come.

Third, the Board in September approved the trial agreement with Platte Woods to provide the 24/7 Police Services for our community. During this 15-month trial period, both cities will review the benefits and/or challenges. When the trial ends and proves to be a success, the plan will be for a merged Police Department that will provide Police Protection for both cities at a reduced cost for both Lake Waukomis and Platte Woods. I have already seen and heard positive comments about our first month of the trial period and hope to hear many more in the upcoming months.

Fourth, we have an opportunity to once again vote for County, State, and Federal officials and issues. On November 6th, which is only a few days away, we all have the right in to vote our conscience. One of the ballot issues is Proposition D. Proposition D will ask voters to raise the fuel tax in 2 ½ cent increments, totaling 10 cents over 4 years. If this ballot issue is passed, Missouri will almost catch up with the loss in purchasing power that the current 17-cent gas tax had in 1996 -- the

last time that tax was adjusted. MODOT has been an outstanding steward of our highway resources and have used their limited resources in prudent ways to make travel on our roads as safe and comfortable as their resources allow. For your information, if this proposal passes, it will not only allow the state to use the much-needed funds for road and bridge improvements, but it also provides road funds for the counties, and cities such as Lake Waukomis. Please be aware that if Proposition D does pass, Lake Waukomis will receive a projected \$13,864 per year in revenue when fully implemented. This amount will be paid for by all Missouri residents, but also from the many visitors and truckers that use our Missouri Roads. I just felt that you should be aware of the facts of the revenue Lake Waukomis will gain if Proposition D does pass. It will provide additional needed funds for Lake Waukomis to be using for improvements on our road infrastructure.

In closing, I would like to remind everyone to drive with caution during this time when the children are out in costume at the Trunk or Treat event at South Park on October 27th, but also on October 31st when the children will be walking our streets with their parents. Also, be mindful of the growing deer population and be cautious while driving.

Enjoy the Fall weather while we have it, because Winter is just around the corner. Remember to smile and pass on a wave to your neighbors.

DEADLINE EXTENDED ON CONTEST FOR ALL LAKE WAUKOMIS RESIDENTS




Everyone watches daily weather forecasts hoping to hear that enough rain is heading our way to fill the lake to normal levels again. We all know it will happen, but WHEN? Rather than just worrying about it, let's have some fun with it. The MEN's CLUB has created a contest as a fund raiser, and everyone is invited to enter.





WINTER INSECTS

This column may bug you, but have you ever wondered how insects survive winter? Many don't but they somehow show up the following spring to become pests. How do they manage to keep coming back? God's plan, Mother Nature or however you believe, insects are a fact of life around Lake Waukomis.

Grasshoppers are hatched from eggs, bet you didn't know that. The eggs survive winter while grasshoppers perish from the cold or various diseases. During the fall, wild turkeys devour every possible grasshopper as a source of protein and food. The poor old "hoppers" are almost paralyzed on a cold morning and the turkeys chow down.

Flies may survive in warm places during cold weather, but they only have a lifespan of about two months or less. They make their triumphant return by hatching out of eggs the last generation left before dying. This is especially good news for those who like to be aggravated at picnics.

Halloween is almost here, so let's discuss **spiders**. Believe it or not, spiders are cold-blooded and have a built-in antifreeze so they will not freeze to death. Many survive under big leaf piles or other cover--like barns, your attic or basement. Mothers die after laying their eggs, generally in the fall. Babies survive in their egg sacs that help keep them warm throughout the cold months so they can hatch to freak you out.

Moths, too, survive the winter in a variety of ways. Some species' eggs laid in late summer or fall do not hatch until the following spring, when there is plenty of food. Many more species spend the winter as caterpillars that remain dormant until spring.

Some insects migrate. Certain **butterflies** and **moths** fly long distances. For example, Monarch butterflies spend the summer in Canada and the Northern U.S. They migrate as far south as Mexico for the winter while other migrating insects, including a variety of moths, don't fly nearly as far.

Termites and **Japanese beetles**, move downward into the soil. **Earthworms**, too, move down, some as far as six feet below the ground surface.

Finally, let's discuss everyone's favorite bug, **mosquitoes**. Mosquitoes are cold-blooded and hibernate in temperatures less than 50 degrees. The adult females lay their eggs in freezing water and die. The eggs hatch in warm weather so another batch of mosquitoes can bite you throughout warm weather.

Minutes The minutes of the previous meeting were approved by unanimous vote.

Treasurer's Report The current financial reports were reviewed. The reports were approved by unanimous vote.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

North Lakes Development Property President Hopper said he met with representatives of the North Lakes Development regarding the purchase of a strip of land adjacent to our city limits between the 600 and 700 blocks. They offered the proposed selling price of \$30,000. We thought the property was worth \$20,000 to \$25,000. To date, we have not heard from their representatives.

Cell Tower President Hopper said the contract was signed and we should get the signing fee of \$20,000 by November 1, 2018. Our contract has been extended until 2052 and renews every five years. When construction begins, we will receive another \$20,000. The pole is designed to carry two more carriers.

COMMITTEE REPORTS: President Hopper asked for committee reports. All written reports are on file and available upon request. He encouraged the Board to send written reports, and for the Directors to be sure and read them. This is to reduce the time spent at the meeting. Copies of the reports were available for residents in attendance.

Community Building Mr. Hoog said he will ask the cleaning company about cleaning the blinds and carpets.

Community Appearance Ms. Wolff submitted a written report. She reported on the fall clean-up to be held on October 13th. She said there will be three dumpsters, a hot lunch will be served to the volunteers and there will be a pick-up service.

Ms. Wolff said the bulletin boards are being refurbished with new paint, plexiglass, etc. She reminded the Board that the volunteer appreciation dinner is November 18th and will be catered by Hy Vee.

Conservation It was reported that the trout will be delivered today at 8 PM. Walleye will be delivered in November.

Dock Placement It was reported that 20 plus docks are being repaired. The work will be done at the spillway.

Ecology/Environmental Efforts Ms. Garrison said the recycling meeting was good. The speaker provided flyers for the Newsletter. She will order organic compost for public consumption and it will be delivered to the park.

4th of July The bank balance at this date is \$23,923.97. The funds will be used for pre-payment of expenses including the fireworks.

Newsletter A resident in the audience expressed his favorable interest in the Newsletter. Ms. Wolff thanked him.

Parkway and Unplatted Property Mr. Ruckman submitted a written report. After discussion he moved to terminate a "Hold Harmless Agreement" from 1992 for the property at 439 North Shore, since it no longer serves a purpose. Mr. Crouch seconded the motion and it was approved by unanimous vote.

Silt Management Mr. Ellis submitted a written report. He said he is pleased with the recent silt removal projects and the cost came in under budget. The parkway in the area will be seeded and straw will be placed on the area by our Maintenance Department.

Stormwater Control President Hopper submitted a written report. The Stormwater Grant project should be completed by November 9th. Wiedermann, Inc. submitted the low bid. Three trees will be removed by Farage Tree and Stump for a cost of \$3,300. This will be paid with the grant funds.

Trailer Park Mr. Crouch submitted a written report. He said there are now 40 trailer spots being rented instead of 34. He said the renters must maintain their own area. Mr. Crouch moved to increase the trailer fee from \$150 per year to \$175 per year. Ms. Garrison seconded and the motion carried, with Mr. Landis voting nay. Mr. Crouch moved to change rules for the trailer park area to state that the renters are responsible for maintaining their own area. Ms. Wolff seconded and the motion carried, with Mr. Ellis voting nay.

Water Quality and Zebra Mussel Control The Board agreed that Ms. Law is doing a good job with the zebra mussel control issue. Discussion was held regarding stickers and whether they need to be changed for the next year.

Coves Signage Mr. Crouch spoke about approving signage for the coves to be provided by The Men's Club. The board agreed by "straw vote". Mr. Crouch said he will give updates throughout the year.

Board moved to Closed Session to discuss personnel matters.

Adjournment The meeting was adjourned at 8:54 PM

CALL TO ORDER: The regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Lake Waukomis, Missouri was called to order by Mayor Pro Tem John Douglas at 7:15 PM, on October 10, 2018 at the Community Building. Alderman John Wurzer, Alderman John Douglas and Alderwoman Debora Hankinson were present as the roll call was taken by Jennifer Miller the City Clerk. Alderman Jeff Libby and Mayor Dennis Todd were absent.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:

MOMENT OF SILENCE: Mayor Pro Tem Douglas called for a moment of silence for all residents in Florida in the path of the hurricane.

Guests: Mayor Pro Tem Douglas welcomed the following guests: Kris & Theresa Kulsrud, Bill & Sandy Massock, Alice Kenney, Gary & Gale Fisher, Randy Gerard, Bill Ruckman, Mike Gibbany, Matt Sauer, Stephen Wahl, Teddi Wolff, Jack Williams, Marcia Douglas, and Dale Crouch.

Consent Agenda: The following topics were on the consent agenda to be acted upon with one motion: Minutes of the Previous Meeting / Accounts Payable. Alderwoman Hankinson moved to approve the consent agenda, Alderman Wurzer seconded and the motion carried by unanimous vote.

Reports: The following written reports were submitted and are on file at the City Office: Financial/Collector, Water Department, Building Inspector, and Police Department.

Parks/IT: Alderwoman Hankinson reported that with all the rain we've had, she is happy we didn't install an irrigation system at the ballfields. Mike Gibbany said grass is starting to sprout.

Kris Kulsrud stated that everything on the website that has to do with the Police has been updated with new contact information. The residence check forms will now be emailed to Platte Woods.

A short discussion was held regarding the IT company that the City uses for service and their non-responsiveness when requesting service. John Douglas and Debora Hankinson will discuss and decide what recommendation to make to the Board.

Dam: Alderman Douglas reported that the Dam inspection went very well. The engineers from the MO Department of Revenue were very complimentary about the maintenance of the Dam and were pleased to see that the police dock had been moved as previously suggested. They also checked the seepage from the spillway and the dam abutments and determined it is not an issue requiring attention at this time. There were no negative findings, so our dam permit should be renewed for another two years. A written report is expected within the next month.

Maintenance: Mike Gibbany reported that the City is in need of one or two sewer pumps to have as back-ups. In reviewing what is left in the budget for 2018, it was decided that the City would order one pump for now. Alderman Wurzer made a motion to approve the purchase of a sewer pump not to exceed \$4500 from account 54011 (sewer repair). Alderwoman Hankinson seconded and the motion carried by unanimous vote.

Department of Public Safety: Officer Skidmore of Platte Woods introduced himself and stated he would be the police liaison and would have some office hours here at Lake Waukomis and would post them on the front of the police office door. He also provided a report for the month of September. Alderman Douglas suggested a record be kept of the number of walk-ins to the office to determine if that is the best use of an officers' time.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Reinvestment of CD's: Alderman Wurzer reported on recent quotes he obtained from a few banks on the City's CD's. He will have discussion with the Board on which CD's would fit best for a 30-month term and will then open the CD's with the bank that has the best rates.

Proposed Ordinance 526: This was tabled.

Water deposit increase: This was tabled.

New resident connection application and fees: This was tabled

Building permit fee discussion: This was tabled.

Policy on expense reimbursements: This was tabled.

Sewer lines in the 800 block: The schedule for the sewer lining in the 800 block has been delayed due to the rain. Mike Gibbany stated that the contractor is hoping to start this next week. The work will be roughly from 803 to 851.

Simple IRA's: A short discussion was held on when the matching of 2% of the employee's salary should go into effect. Alderman Wurzer stated there were some guidelines and restrictions that we had to follow and will check on that and confirm with Alderman Douglas to help develop the 2019 budget.

Cutting of tree limbs hanging over the roads: Mike Gibbany reported that there are some tree limbs hanging over the roads that are an extension of trees in residents' yards. These limbs are being hit by the trash truck, box trucks, etc. and are posing a safety issue. He questioned what we should or could do to remove those limbs. Jennifer Miller will check with other City Clerks to see how this is handled and report that to the Board and Mike. In addition, the Board asked Alderman Douglas to check with the city attorney regarding potential liability issues.

NEW BUSINESS:

Approval to fill Maintenance position: Alderman Wurzer made a motion that the City hire Bill Ruckman for the Maintenance position with the understanding that the position would be \$25 per hour, 20 hours per week and not to exceed 1000 hours per calendar year. Alderwoman Hankinson seconded and the motion carried by unanimous vote.

First review of 2019 draft budgets: Alderman Wurzer asked for more solid figures for each department by the November meeting in order to have the budget ready for approval in December.

Men's Club lighting proposal: The Men's Club would like to add some type of lighting to the end of the foot bridge as well as the spillway steps that are being built. They asked the Board if this would be a proposal the City would be interested in and if so, they would move forward and bring a detailed proposal back to the Board when it's ready. The Board members stated they would be interested.

Mayor's Christmas tree project: Alderman Douglas reported that the date for decorating the community building and the Dam would be November 17th. Anyone is welcome to come and help beginning at 9:00 a.m. November 25th will be the Christmas tree lighting ceremony at the Community Building. The time is to be determined.

Volunteer appreciation proclamation: Alderwoman Hankinson made a motion for the Mayor to proclaim the month of November as Volunteer Appreciation month. The motion was seconded by Alderman Wurzer and carried by unanimous vote. The volunteer appreciation dinner will be November 18th from 5-7 PM at the Community Building.

Fall Clean-up: Alderwoman Hankinson made a motion to approve the funds for half of the cost of the dumpsters up to \$600 and to come from account number 53023 (Maintenance Misc. Expense). The motion was seconded by Alderman Wurzer and carried by unanimous vote.

Miscellaneous: Dale Crouch stated that a trailer belonging to the City had been sitting in the trailer park for the past 10 years and asked about having it removed as the City has no use for it. Alderwoman Hankinson made a motion to give the HOA authorization to dispense of the trailer however they wish and that any funds received be reinvested into the trailer park. Alderman Wurzer seconded and the motion carried by unanimous vote.

Adjournment: Alderman Wurzer moved to adjourn the meeting, Alderwoman Hankinson seconded and the motion carried by unanimous vote. The meeting was adjourned at 8:40 PM.
